What is the Communities for Environmental Justice Network (CEJN) Project?

Since April 2023, the [Commission for Environmental Cooperation](#) (CEC) has supported the creation of a trinational network to facilitate the exchange of community-based expertise, lessons learned, and practical guidance between network participants, through its project Communities for Environmental Justice Network (CEJN).

The Network aims to strengthen the capacity of North American Indigenous, local, vulnerable, disadvantaged, and/or underserved communities to address environmental justice concerns in the context of climate change.

How Will the Communities for Environmental Justice Network be Developed?

The initial development of the Communities for Environmental Justice Network is supported by the Commission for Environmental Cooperation with the long-term goal that it will become a self-sustaining and member-driven structure that fosters collaboration and knowledge exchange across North America.

To help member organizations clarify the overall goals, objectives and structure of the Network, and to catalyze the exchange of resources between participants, the following activities have been prioritized in 2023 and 2024.

- 1 Select and invite communities for inclusion in the CEJN and engage them as founding members of the Network.
- 2 Host a trinational workshop to facilitate the exchange of community-based environmental justice stories, strategies, and lessons learned between founding members, to clarify Network goals and objectives, and to identify next steps to advance Network development.
- 3 Develop and disseminate knowledge exchange tools and culturally relevant information based on information and resources shared during the trinational workshop.

Sharing Our Stories

The CEJN hosted a trinational workshop from 16–18 November 2023, in Oaxaca, Mexico. The event was attended by representatives from thirteen (13) organizations and communities from across North America that have environmental justice concerns. Collaborative team-building exercises, knowledge sharing, and brainstorming activities helped build trust between participants as they exchanged community-based success stories, strategies, and lessons learned. Common resource gaps and project roadblocks were also identified. Workshop participants emphasized that creating a trinational Network to connect members with



needed resources, advice for overcoming project barriers, and encouragement from others was vital to help advance environmental justice initiatives across North America.
